The Henry Jones Art Hotel is right at the centre of the action on the Hobart waterfront



isiting the Henry Jones Art Hotel in the heart of Hobart is like reading a love letter to the history, culture and beauty of Tasmania. The hotel, with its innovative design, has been created from a row of former warehouses of the IXL jam empire, owned by Sir Henry Jones, dating from the early 19th century and featuring grand beams of rough-hewed timber and hand-cut stone walls.

Part of the state's story is told through the hundreds of beautiful artworks on the walls of this intimate art hotel, the first-ofits-kind in Tasmania, but they are not the only gorgeous thing about it.

The boutique hotel, with no two rooms the same, sits right on the Hobart waterfront, and guests who choose to book a Deluxe Spa Harbour View Room will wake up to the dreamy view of crystal blue water and the boats moored at its edges, so picturesque that the window view is like an artwork in itself.

A complimentary art history tour through the hotel is offered to guests who are able to sip on a glass of Champagne as they are walked through the line-up of works including prestigious paintings by John Glover – a successful British artist who started a new life in Tasmania in the 1830s – as well as those of professional and emerging artists.

Despite the hotel's 56 rooms and suites, restaurants and bar, it has an intimate feel.

From cosy fires, to being able to meet some of the artists visiting in person, to

cocktails that literally catch fire and melt in your mouth from the drinks specialists at the hotel's IXL Long Bar, guests are made to feel right at home.

The hotel – celebrating its 20th birthday this year – seems much more than a "hotel" because while there's no doubt its five star rating is well-deserved, the property is simply so much more than what the term suggests.


The Henry Jones has been created in one of Tasmania's most significant industrial heritage sites, with its own allday cafe Jam Packed, a restaurant and bar.

Described as a tourist attraction in its own right, the hotel's Landscape Restaurant and Grill, which takes its name from John Glover's paintings that capture life in 19th-century Tasmania, has a menu that showcases the work of the asado grill, including steak from almost all Tasmanian producers that is exceptional.

The eye fillet is stunning and leaves a smooth yet smoky flavour with every bite.

The restaurant has a varied selection of sides to complement the beef including duck fat pink eye potatoes with rosemary
